Only 20 social enterprises are operational, most having been launched as recently as April 2011. They will also be operating in an increasingly competitive market owing to changes in health legislation currently going through Parliament. This National Audit Office report highlights risks to value for money associated with the Department of Health's programme aimed at enabling its staff to take the lead in leaving the NHS - or 'spinning out' - to set up health social enterprises. The report points out that many risks and liabilities still reside with the PCTs and will need to be managed if value for money is to be achieved. In the last resort, the trust or its successors will be responsible for ensuring that essential services continue to

operate. These are independent bodies delivering services, previously provided in-house, under contract to Primary Care Trusts. At least for a time, social enterprises will be highly dependent on work and cash flow from their respective PCTs. PCTs or their successors will need to have a clear idea of how they will react if enterprises run into financial difficulty or fail. PCTs expected social enterprises to deliver more benefits than other providers, but did not generally contract for them to deliver savings or any other additional benefits. At this early stage of the 'Right to Request Programme', it is too early to assess its costs and benefits. There is a large difference in how RMNCH conditions affect different income groups; investments in RMNCH can lessen the disparity in terms of both health and financial risk. There have been calls to revisit the experiences of TB screening campaigns that were widely applied in Europe and North America in the mid-20th century, as well as more recent experiences with TB screening in countries with a high burden of the disease, and to assess their possible relevance for TB care and prevention in the 21st century. comprehensive assessment by WHO of the appropriateness of screening for active TB since the recommendations made in 1974 by the Expert Committee. It calls for more and better research to assess the impact of screening and to develop and evaluate new screening tests and approaches. In response, WHO has developed guidelines on screening for active TB. This book sets out basic principles for prioritizing risk groups and choosing a screening approach; it also emphasizes the importance of assessing the epidemiological situation, adapting approaches to local situations, integrating TB screening into other health-promotion activities, minimizing the risk of harm to individuals, and engaging in continual monitoring and evaluation. As discussed in detail in this book, there is a need to balance potential benefits against the risks and costs of screening; this conclusion is mirrored by the history of TB screening. Evidence suggests that some risk groups should always be screened, whereas the prioritization of other risk groups as well as the choice of screening approach depend on the epidemiology, the health-system context, and the resources available. This report assesses approaches to social care integration currently being taken by health care providers and systems, and new or emerging approaches and opportunities; current roles in such integration by different disciplines and organizations, and new or emerging roles and types of providers; and current and emerging efforts to design health care systems to improve the nation's health and reduce health inequities. Improving social conditions remains critical to improving health outcomes, and integrating social care into health care delivery is more relevant than ever in the context of the pandemic and increased strains placed on the U.
